Lesson Plans that Work Year B – Season after Pentecost, Proper 26 Lesson Plans for Younger Children

Scripture: Mark 12:28-34

Background: During the last weeks of Ordinary Time in Lectionary Cycle B, the Gospel of Mark, our primary guide, continues. The kingdom of God is open for all people. We hear this message in the readings about the rich man, the disciples jockeying for position, the blind man, the saints, the poor widow, and even Pilate as he queries Jesus about being a king. We don't have to pass an entrance exam; we are already in the kingdom. Through all the changes that occur in our lives, what will not change is God's love for each of us. The kingdom that Jesus is proclaiming is already here and yet is also still to come – the undercurrent of Advent, which is coming near.

A Notation for This Week's Gospel

The question from the scribes this week is not meant to be one to challenge or trip Jesus up. Rather, it is common in Jewish tradition to ask if there is a way to summarize commandments. Jesus, in turn, gives a rather traditional answer, siting Deuteronomy 6:4-5 (*Hear, O Israel: The Lord is our God, the Lord alone. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might)* and Leviticus 19:18 (*You shall not take vengeance or bear a grudge against any of your people, but you shall love your neighbor as yourself: I am the Lord*). Jesus uses these two passages as a foundation for becoming a whole person of God. For Jesus, these are the core texts of faith and belief.

Theme: Love God, Neighbor, and Self

Before Class: You will need enough copies of the two signs below for everyone as well as popsicle sticks, glue, markers or crayons, and other art supplies for the children. You may want to pre-cut this signs to make it easier for the children.

Beginning: As the children gather, ask them how their week was.

After most of them are there, ask them what laws or rules they have to follow each day. Ask them if they think it helps or not to have laws and rules for all of us to live by. Ask them how they know about the laws...are there signs (like stop signs) that help show us the way?

Opening Prayer: Gracious God, thank you for giving us rules to follow and for sending Jesus to help us understand what your rules mean. Amen.

The Story: Mark 12:28-34: Some of the people around Jesus were arguing one day. When Jesus found them, they asked him, "Which commandment or law is the first?" Jesus said to them, "The first commandment or law is that you love God with all your heart, soul, mind, and strength. The second commandment or law is that you should love your neighbor as you love yourself." Jesus told them that there were no other commandments or laws that were more important than these two. Those around him were amazed at what he had told them.



Activity: Today, Jesus told the disciples what commandments or laws they needed to follow. Do you remember what those were?

(Allow the children to respond and you can prompt them if needed, or read the story again.) I wonder what both commandments or law have in common? (love)

What are ways that we know about the laws that we have to follow? (signs – like stop signs or walk signs)

Today we are going to make signs that remind us of Jesus' commandments or laws for us.

Hand out the two signs below, "Love God" and "Love neighbor and self" and invite them to color, decorate, or create a sign that helps them remember Jesus' laws for us.

When they are done with their decoration, help them glue or staple the signs to the popsicle stick.

Getting Closure: If there is time allow the children to share their signs with one another.

If you have time, you can teach them the "Love Round" found below.





Theme: Love God, Neighbor, and Self

Before Class: You will need enough copies of the Bible or enough copies of the passage for each child. You will also need enough copies (and a few extra in case any children want an extra or need to start over) of the "commandment cube" found below. *If you are doing the commandment cube, it might be a good idea to cut and fold and glue one yourself so you have an idea of how to help the children with this.*

Beginning: As the children gather, ask them how their week was. After most of them are there, ask them what laws or rules they have to follow each day. Ask them if they think it helps or not to have laws and rules for all of us to live by.

Opening Prayer: Gracious God, thank you for giving us your commandments to follow and for sending Jesus to help us more fully see what living into your law looks like. Be with us today as we study your word. Amen.

The Story: Mark 12:28-34 You can invite one or two children to simply read the passage, or you can have the children read it in parts. (see below for a script)

Reflection Ouestions:

• I wonder what you remember most about this passage?



- I wonder what might have surprised you?
- I wonder why the scribes even asked the question?
- I wonder what is Jesus saying to us in these two commandments?

Activity:

We are going to take a few minutes to think about what these commandments mean for us. (You can either do this by having the children brainstorm out loud and writing the answers up on the board or easel paper OR you can have them do this work by themselves.) Only spend a minute or two on each one so they have a chance to do the cube activity.

How do you love God with all your heart? How do you love God with all your soul? How do you love God with all your mind? How do you love God with all your strength? How do you love your neighbor? How do you love yourself?

Once they have had the chance to respond to each of these, hand out the pictures of the cube. In each square have the draw or write things that belong there (such as: we love God with all our Heart by praying, treating others well, not taking God's name in vane, etc.)

When they are done, have them cut around the edges of the cube, fold in the trapezoid pieces, fold on the lines and it should fold into a cube.

Getting Closure: Invite them to share their cubes. If you have time, you can have one of the children roll their cube and whatever side lands up, each child shares something they did for that category, or they can act out what is written there.

Closing Prayer: Loving God, thank you for opening your word to us today. Be with us as we strive to love you, our neighbors, and ourselves. Amen.

Narrator: One of the scribes came near and heard them disputing with one another, and seeing that he answered them well, he asked him,

Scribe: 'Which commandment is the first of all?'

Narrator: When Jesus saw that he answered wisely, he said to him,


Jesus: 'You are not far from the kingdom of God.'

Scripture: Mark 12:28-34

Theme: Love God, Neighbor, and Self

Before Class: You will need Bibles or copies of the scripture passage for today. You will need easel paper, markers, paper, and pens.

Beginning: As people are gathering, have two sheets of easel paper up in the room. On one sheet write, "How do we love God?" and on the other, "How do we love our neighbors as ourselves?" As people arrive, invite them to write their first thoughts on each piece of paper, or, alternatively, you could do this later as you are processing the passage.

Opening Prayer: Gracious God, thank you for giving us your commandments to follow and for sending Jesus to help us more fully see what living into your law looks like. Be with us today as we study your word. Amen

The Scripture: Mark 12:28-34 Invite someone to read the passage, or you can have the participants go around the room, each reading one line of the passage.

Reflection Questions:

- I wonder what struck you about this passage?
- I wonder what surprised you?
- Why do you think the scribes even asked the question?



• These seem like pretty simple answers, but once we start to really look at the commandments, what is Jesus telling us in these two commandments?

(Pointing to the two sheets of paper that are up with the questions on them, ask...)

- How do we love God with our God with all our heart, soul, mind, and strength? (write, or have someone else write, their answers on the sheet of paper OR you could give them some quiet time with paper to reflect and then write their own responses on the sheet)
- How do we love our neighbor as ourselves? (write, or have someone else write, their answers on the sheet of paper OR you could give them some quiet time with paper to reflect and then write their own responses on the sheet)
- What do you think are some of the obstacles that get in the way?

Getting Closure: Invite the group to reflect...

What do you think are some of the obstacles that get in the way of us loving God, loving our neighbors, and loving ourselves?

Closing Prayer: Loving God, thank you for opening your word to us today. Be with us as we strive to love you, our neighbors, and ourselves. Amen.
