

**Lesson Plans that Work**  
**Year C – All Saints’ Day (On or Near November 1)**  
**Lesson Plan for Younger Children**

**Scripture: Luke 6:20-26**

*Note: This is the lesson plan for All Saints Day/All Saints Sunday. Check with your clergy person about what propers you are using for this Sunday. Some churches use All Saints, others use the Sunday Propers.*

**Background**

All Saints’ Day invites us to look way back to the very early days of the Church and at people whose lives are an inspiration for us. It also invites us to remember those whom we love that have gone on through the gates of larger life. It calls us to notice those in our midst who show us a brighter way to live. In some mysterious way we are gathered, now, with all those who have gone before, with those we love who live in different parts of the world, as well as with those in the room with us. From the earliest days, the church has taken this opportunity to celebrate and we are invited to join in the celebration.

Quoting from *Holy Women, Holy Men*, “From its earliest days the Church has rejoiced to recognize and commemorate those faithful departed who were extraordinary or even heroic servants of God and of God’s people for the sake and after the example of their Savior Jesus Christ. By this recognition and commemoration, their devoted service endures in the Spirit, even as their example and fellowship continue to nurture the pilgrim Church on its way.”

Those in bold are major feast days.

You will need to choose some saints for the children to explore in class. Print them out try to find some pictures of them. You will also need copies of the oval below (if you choose you can cut them out) and crayons or markers.

**Theme: For All the Saints** (The title of Hymn # 287, Hymnal 1982.)

**Beginning:** As each person enters greet them saying, “Welcome Saint \_\_\_\_\_” and insert their name. If you are using nametags, you could write the word **Saint** at the top of each nametag.

Today is All Saints Day. I wonder if any of you know what a saint is? (give the children time to respond) Saints are people who the Church remembers because they were extraordinary, heroic servants of God and God’s people. By remembering them, their service becomes an example for us to follow. Today, we will be exploring this together.

**Opening Prayer:** For all the saints we thank you, God. Help us to celebrate those who show us how to live and help us to choose to be the saints you call us to be. Amen.

**The Story:** Jesus wanted to teach his disciples how to act and how to treat others, so he said to them, you are blessed if you have lost what you have, because God's kingdom is there for you. You are blessed when you are hungry, because you are ready to feast with God. You are blessed when you cry and are sad because God is there to lift you up into joy. When someone is mean to you and you are not mean back, that means that you are closer to God's love. But watch out for those who think they have everything and are satisfied and only play and not work too. Those who live this way will find themselves disappointed and not in God's favor.

It's not about clutching what you have, holding it tight in your hands. (show this with your hands, explaining how holding tight does not allow you to receive anything)

It is about holding your hands, palms up, expecting good things. (open your hands to show the children how to receive good things.)

The bottom line? Do to others what you would want them to do to you.

**Questions:**

- I wonder if you have heard of the Golden Rule: Do to others as you would have them do to you?
- I wonder what you think that means?

**Activity:** The church remembers amazing people who we call saints. The saints are people who the Church remembers because they were extraordinary, heroic servants of God and God's people. By remembering them, their service becomes an example for us to follow. Today, we will be exploring this together.

Today, we are going to learn about some saints. People who lived by the Golden Rule and followed what Jesus teaches.


(Talk through the saints you have chosen, and show them pictures.)

Invite the children to each take an oval and draw a picture of a saint that you talked about today.

**Getting Closure:** Invite the children to share the saints pictures that they created.

**Closing Prayer:** Thank you God, for giving us the example of the saints. Help us to remember them so we can better know how to follow you. Amen.

**Lesson Plan for Older Children**

**Scripture: Luke 6:20-26**

**Theme: For All the Saints** (The title of Hymn # 287, Hymnal 1982.)

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You will need copies of the script below for each person, a long, wide length of paper (roll of craft paper or box of freezer paper). Ovals (pattern below) cut from dark construction paper + colored chalk. Or ovals cut from white paper + crayons or markers. Glue or transparent tape. Option: print out some of the biographies of saints from [www.satucket.com/lectionary](http://www.satucket.com/lectionary).

**Beginning:** As each person enters greet them saying, “Welcome Saint \_\_\_\_\_” and insert their name. If you are using nametags, you could write the word **Saint** at the top of each nametag.

**Scripture: Luke 20:27-38** Invite children to read with you the scripture for today. You will see from the script below that it is broken down into “teacher” and “child” parts line by line. You can have each child read a line, or invite three to rotate through the lines.

**Questions:**

I wonder what stood out for you in today's reading?

I wonder what Jesus meant with all of these instructions?

I wonder how this tells us about saints and how they lived their lives?

I wonder how we might say these things today? (an example is below)

It's not about clutching what you have, holding it tight in your hands.

It is about holding your hands, palms up, expecting good things.

It's not about stuffing yourself with empty calories, but waiting for the food that really satisfies.

And the bottom line? Do to others what you would want them to do to you.

**“For All the Saints” Banner**

Invite each child to think of a saint that they might know. If you printed out some examples of saints, allow the children to explore these saints and maybe to discover new ones. Invite them to choose one saint, either an official saint, or someone they know who they would be considered a saint (someone who helps them, someone they loved who did good things, etc.)

When everyone has found a saint, invite each child to take ovals and add features to create a simple portrait of at least one of the saints they have identified. Young children can show the way to make simple cartoon-type portraits. The name of the saint may be written on the oval if the person wants to do so.

**Getting Closure:** When all the ovals are completed, invite the children to share the saint they have created. Once they have shared, the child to attach the portraits on the long sheet of paper to create a banner.

**Closing Prayer:** *Collect of a Saint (Book of Common Prayer, page 250)*

Almighty God, you have surrounded us with a great cloud of witnesses: Grant that we, encouraged by the good example of your servants, may persevere in running the race that is set before us, until at last we may with him attain to your eternal joy; through Jesus Christ, the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen.*

**Child:** If anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also;


**Teacher:** and from anyone who takes away your coat do not withhold even your shirt.

Today is All Saints Day. What do we mean by saints? (invite conversation and if you wish you can read the quote from *Holy Women, Holy Men* above.)

**Opening Prayer:** For all the saints – those who have gone on and those right here in our lives, we thank you, God. Help us to celebrate those who show us the way and help us to choose to be the saints you call us to be. Amen.

**Scripture: Luke 20:27-38** Invite someone to read the scripture for today. Invite a period of silence for reflection. If you choose, you can then have another person read the scripture again using a different translation.

**Questions:**

- I wonder what stood out for you in today's reading?
- I wonder what Jesus was trying to get across to those who were listening to him?
- Why do you think this reading was chosen for All Saints' Day? What does it tell us about how saints may have acted?
- I wonder how we might say these things today? (an example is below)
  - It's not about clutching what you have, holding it tight in your hands.
  - It is about holding your hands, palms up, expecting good things.
  - It's not about stuffing yourself with empty calories, but waiting for the food that really satisfies. And the bottom line? Do to others what you would want them to do to you.

**Exploring the Saints**

Invite each person to think of a saint that they might know. If you printed out some examples of saints, allow them to explore these saints and maybe to discover new ones. You could also have some copies of *Holy Women*, *Holy Men* or a computer with internet access. Invite each person to choose one saint, either an official saint, or someone they know who they would be considered a saint and list three things they admire about this saint.

**Getting Closure:** When everyone has found a saint, invite each person to share what they admire about that person. (If you choose, you can list the qualities that each person admires on a large piece of paper.)

**Closing Prayer:** *Collect of a Saint (Book of Common Prayer, page 250)*
