### About Privilege

Privilege in the context of racial justice is benefitting from parts of our identities. In our last lesson, we identified the dominant culture. Members of the dominant culture have certain levels of privilege, even if they differ in socioeconomic status or gender. If you are white, middle class or higher, cisgender, and male, you have more privilege than a black, middle-class or higher, cisgender, and female person. The intersectionality of our identities determines our level of privilege. For example, I am a black woman, so I don't have as much privilege as a white man. I have a master's degree and work full time, so I have privilege due to my education. Where I find privilege, I spend it on others with less than what I have. Being a person of color does not mean you are powerless. We have privilege to spend!

### Becoming Beloved Community Four-fold path:

#### Telling the Truth about the church and race

Acknowledging our privilege is a step in telling the truth about our complicity in racism and white supremacy.

Will you persevere in resisting evil, and whenever we fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord?

How can we use our privilege to combat racism and bring about justice?

## Bible Study

**Scripture 1:** [James 2:1-26](#)

**Scripture 2:** [Matthew 20:1-16](#)

- Read James 2:1-26. What words or phrases stand out to you?
- Read verses 2-4 and 26. What surprises you about these passages? Notice and comment on anything you wish to share.
- Read the four verses one more time. What do those verses say about privilege?
- Now read Matthew 20:1-16. What words or phrases do you notice?
- Read verses 10-16. What surprises you about those verses? Share any observations or realizations you have.
- Read verses 10-16 one more time. What do you think about the laborers who arrived first? What do those verses say about the landowner?
- How can you apply the learning from James to your understanding of privilege and spending your privilege?
- How does Jesus' teaching in Matthew inform your understanding of privilege? Did you learn more from the landowner or the laborers? Why?
- Read a different translation. How does it change your understanding of the scripture?
